Provide compassionate, quality care to my patients;


Partner with them to promote health;

RULES AND ORDER OF BUSINESS

The House of Delegates shall convene on Saturday April 30, 2022. The meeting is scheduled to take place from 9:00 am to projected adjournment of 3:00 pm.

DELAGATE ACCREDITATION: The Secretary/ Treasurer shall furnish the Credentials Committee a list of the accredited Delegates and Alternates. The Chairman of the Credentials Committee shall certify and call the Delegates and Alternates to be seated. They must be ratified members in good standing of MOA.

DELEGATES' SEATING: A Delegate, having been seated, shall remain the accredited Delegate throughout the session unless an Alternate is seated in his/her place. The Alternate shall be seated if the regular Delegate is not present and shall retain the chair for the entire session.

SPEAKER: The Speaker shall be the presiding officer and shall, with the approval of the House of Delegates, appoint the House Reference Committees.

VOTING PRIVILEGES: Each Delegate shall have one vote in the House. The Presiding officer shall vote only in the care of a tie vote.

SECRETARY: The Secretary/ Treasurer of MOA shall be the Secretary of the House. Parliamentary rules of debate shall be observed and Robert's Rules of Order, Revised, shall be the guide to all deliberations, except when otherwise provided for in the MOA Bylaws.

SUSPENSION OF RULES: The Rules and Order of Business shall govern the procedure unless unanimously suspended by the vote of the House.

QUORUM: Forty of the voting members of the House shall constitute a quorum; and a quorum having been declared present at the first session, shall be declared present for the entire meeting.

GUESTS: The following persons shall be, during all but executive session, permitted to sit in the House without voice: a) members of the association, b) employees of the association, c) special guests.

Nominations and elections of officers and Delegates shall be held during the House session.

PROPOSED AOA DELEGATE SELECTION PROCESS

1. January 7 - MOA staff announces the opening of AOA H of D nominations to the Component Presidents and sends nomination forms. With that announcement, the component presidents will be provided with contact information for the component society presidents, and the MOA Board members by region. Before the due date of February 18, the MOA staff will reach out to the component presidents with reminders requesting their nominee list and work through the MOA Board members as needed, depending on local circumstances. The target is at least 70% of AOA allotted seats, given that 50% minus one are elected by the House.

NOTE: The Nomination form should state AOA H of D meeting date, note membership requirement of MOA and AOA by nominee, and request the nominee's commitment to attend and participate whether the AOA H of D is held virtually or face-to-face.

- **2. February 18** Components must complete and return their nomination form no later than February 18. Before February 18, MOA staff will follow-up with component presidents, and MOA Board members, if necessary, to attain goal numbers.
- **3. March 1** As names are received by MOA from components, staff will compile the lists in ballot format, to be completed by March 1. Staff will also route the list to MOA Board members.
- **4. March 7** MOA will send the list of nominees, sorted by component, in ballot format to the component society presidents and MOA Board members, including contact info for each nominee by March 7.

- **5. March 7** A list of the component presidents and their contact information, as well as the MOA Board members by region and their contact information, will be included with the list of nominees being sent to the components and the MOA board members. The components may then contact each other to work out their votes if they wish to do so.
- **6. April 4** The component president or MOA Board member must return the ballots to the MOA for tally by April 4., including alternates (if applicable).
- 7. April 15 MOA staff will send the final list of the elected delegates, and the remaining nominees as alternates, to the Component Presidents and MOA board members by April 15.
- **8. April 20** Once the final list is compiled, the MOA staff will create a slide for projection at the MOA H of D listing the Delegates by April 20.
- **9. April 30** The slide created by the MOA staff will be projected at the appropriate time during the MOA HOD being held on April 30.

RECOMMENDATION: Approve as amended

ACTION TAKEN AT MOA HOD:

Whereas, medical providers, including Osteopathic Physicians, are well educated and familiar with medical knowledge INFORMATION, some of which may appear in conflictING; and

Whereas, the Michigan Osteopathic Association (MOA) is an organization delivering WHOSE MISSION INCLUDES supportING to Michigan's Osteopathic Physicians IN THEIR CLINICAL PRACTICE; and

Whereas, Osteopathic Physicians are taught to be objective to IN EVALUATING voluminous medical data; and

Whereas, the MOA's role as a physician support organization must support non-prevailing

whereas, the MOA's role as a physician support organization must support non-prevailing opposing views; and

Whereas, alternative views INTERPRETATIONS OF MEDICAL INFORMATION by medical professionals have always been considered, normal SINCE ONE APPROACH MAY NOT FIT ALL SITUATIONS (one size never fits all), and

Whereas, the label of "misinformation" should be dismissed for reasonable nonlethal alternative medical options, which have the potential to become the prevailing appropriate medical management; and

Whereas, recall that Andrew Taylor Still, MD, DO's Osteopathic philosophy was criticized as radical and would MAY have been considered "misinformation," later to be accepted as mainstay medical management; therefore be it

Resolved, that the MOA must support a tenet that alternate medical management OPTIONS must SHOULD not be AUTOMATICALLY dismissed as "misinformation," PROVIDED THAT NO HARM TO THE PATIENT OCCURRED; and be it further

Resolved, that Osteopathic Physicians being accused of proposing misinformation, be protected from being financially, reputationally, and academically, penalized by organizations and employers-popularly labeled as "cancel culture": GIVEN DUE PROCESS IN ORDER TO PRESENT OBJECTIVE, EVIDENCE-BASED DATA WHICH SUPPORT THE CLINICAL PRACTICES AND DECISIONS BEING CHALLENGED AS "MISINFORMATION"; and be it further

Resolved, that the MOA forward this resolution properly formatted to the American Osteopathic Association (AOA) for national consideration and adoption.

Epilog-FOOTNOTE: Examples of treatments deemed favorable after medical scrutiny **INCLUDE** BUT are not limited to: *H. pylori* association with RELATIONSHIP TO gastrointestinal dysfunction, VITAMIN B-12 usage replacing AS AN OPTION TO folic acid for treatment of pernicious anemia; respirator limitations in Covid related lung disease; OMT implementation for musculo-skeletal Osteopathic lesions; and more.

Caveat: be cautious in dismissing treatments which may be beneficial in the treatment of your patients, family, or self.

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Whereas, credentialing is required for all licensed individual health care professionals to participate with health insurance companies; AND,

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Whereas, physician credentialing, the process of evaluating the qualifications and practice history of a physician, can sometimes take as long as 120 days, SUBSEQUENTLY sidelining physicians and creating barriers to patient care; AND,

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Whereas, delays in the credentialing process add administrative costs that are especially damaging to physicians in rural communities and those who have recently completed graduate medical education programs; AND,

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Whereas, the credentialing process is prone to human error, which in turn results in missing data and delayed delivery of information, which then ultimately leads to delays in patient care; AND,

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Whereas, the credentialing process is time-consuming, costly, dangerous, and often inaccurate WITH 85 percent of applications are missing critical information that is required for processing; AND THEREFORE BE IT,

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Whereas, medical practices spend, on average, \$7,000 for each provider's credentialing application, plus 20 hours of administrative time;

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Whereas, until physicians are credentialed, claims for the services they provide may go unpaid;

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NOTES FROM REFERENCE COMMITTEE: this resolution contains MULTIPLE statements without any references to evidence to support these statements. The MOA cannot take a stand without showing systematic issue or evidence of malfeasance.


